



Ladybug Picture Book Award 2018 Voting Guide




























The Ladybug Picture Book Award is a program of the Center for the Book at the New Hampshire State Library and is designed to promote early literacy and honor the best in recent children's picture books. A committee of children's librarians from around the state selects 10 picture book titles each spring. Then, during November, New Hampshire children from preschoolers to those in third grade choose the award winner. The winning picture book is announced at the end of the year.

To be considered for nomination, a picture book must meet the following criteria:

- be published, in its current edition, within the last three years
- be in print
- have an author and illustrator both residing in the United States
- possess strong child appeal
- have artistic quality with text that supports the illustrations
- not be a title previously nominated (visit our website for a list)


Voting may be held anywhere there are Granite State kids of eligible Ladybug voting age (up to 3rd graders). To be a voting site you must make all nominated books for that year available to your voters (this can be through storytimes, making the books available for kids to read themselves, or to take home, or a combination of these).

Voting materials for 2018, including a picture ballot, printable tally sheet, and the online tally form are all available at http://ladybug.nhbookcenter.org. There is also an order form to purchase voting and book stickers and several customizable flyers you can download to help promote your Ladybug events.

Voting may be conducted in any way that works for the voting site—picture ballots, raised hands, gathering near the book (Iowa-caucus style), putting an object in a container by the chosen book (like a penny raffle), or whatever you come up with that results in a count of votes for each nominated title that reflects the choices of the kids involved.

Votes must be received at the State Library, either through the online ballot or on an official tally sheet, by 4:30pm, Friday, December 7, 2018 in order to be counted.

This guide includes information and activities about each of the ten titles nominated for the 2018 Ladybug Picture Book Award. This information was compiled by Deborah Dutcher, Youth and Adult Services Librarian, NHSL.



The Rooster Who Would Not be Quiet! by Carmen Agra Deedy, illustrated by Eugene Yelchin (New York, NY: Scholastic Press, 2017)







Hello Goodbye Dog by Maria Gianferrari, illustrated by Patrice Barton (New York, NY: Roaring Brook Press, 2017)

"PreS-Gr 2—Like most dogs, Moose loves "hello" and hates "goodbye." "Hello" is a ride in the car, a pat on the head, or a visit with her favorite people. "Goodbye" is a closed door and being alone. Moose loves "hello" most when it involves her favorite human, Zara. When Zara steers her wheelchair into her family's van, it means good-bye. Not for long. After all, one thing Moose loves almost as much as "hello" is being read to, and what better place to be read to than school? So Moose finds ways to get to school, much to the chagrin of the staff. Finally Zara gets the idea to have Moose certified as a therapy dog so she can say hello to the schoolchildren every day and help them read. The author's note explains the difference between therapy

dogs, which help bolster the confidence of young readers, among other tasks, and service dogs, which require more specialized training. Sweet, skillfully rendered illustrations are clear, convey Moose's worldview, and depict a diverse group of people. Even the dog's expressions—forlorn when she is trapped behind the screen door, sheepish when she resists an order, triumphant when she finds her human again—are instantly recognizable and contribute to the impact of the story." –School Library Journal






Courage Badges: Craft (cardboard or cardstock) a badge that has the word Courage on it. Decorate. Children can wear it when they are facing a challenging situation.
